## 1 Introduction

The Cambridge Youths tercentenary celebrations form an arc from January 2024 to December 2025 to encompass the founding of the Society in 1724 and the first recorded peal by the Society in November 1725.

This final report begins with a summary on early planning and preparatory activities that began in 2022. This is followed by a section on ringing performances across the arc of 2024 and 2025 associated with the tercentenary, after which there is a section summarising the work that went into participating in the Cambridge Folk Festival and a section on organising the September 2024 dinner weekend. The final section provides shorter reports on other events organised or participated in during the year 2024 as part of the tercentenary celebrations.

## 2 Early planning and preparation

This section provides background on early planning and preparatory activities that culminated in a set of events that formed the tercentenary celebrations held during 2024. This section also touches on a few key moments during this period.

The timeline for planning events celebrating our tercentenary extends well before the start of 2024. As early as February 2022, more than two and a half years before the dinner weekend celebrations, moves were afoot to secure the ideal dinner venue. The Great Hall of Trinity College is not somewhere that you can book in the normal way, and we have Dave Richards to thank for setting things in motion. Through a connection with a GSM PCC member who is also a Trinity College fellow, we made a case for holding our dinner in this prestigious setting. To great delight and a modicum of surprise, in March 2022 we received a college resolution to hold the dinner in the Great Hall.

With this cornerstone of our celebrations in place, a dedicated group of SCY members started planning a range of possible events that might happen. This core group comprised George Unsworth, Gareth Davies, Phil Orme, Lesley Boyle, and Liz Orme, with the ongoing support of Dave Richards. Over the period from October 2022 to June 2024 this group met every two to three months, by Teams or face-to-face, and provided progress updates on a range of events, all captured and maintained in a 'To Do' list. At the Society's EGM in November 2023 the organising of events linked to the tercentenary was put on a more formal footing when Liz Orme agreed to take on the role of overall organiser. In the final weeks and months leading up to key events such as the Cambridge Folk Festival and the tercentenary dinner weekend, group meetings were replaced by more targeted catchups supported by detailed plans and involving a wider group of volunteers.

Whether or not events were taken forward depended mainly upon the willingness of members of this core group to take responsibility for and make time to pursue them. Besides those mentioned in the main body of this report, many much smaller activities were progressed to their conclusion, for example, compiling a

complete and fully up to date list of members and producing a framed list of members elected between 1999 and 2024 to hang up in GSM ringing room. Some ideas for events were not followed through and are unlikely to be picked up again in future, for example, organising 'handbells on a punt' for publicity purposes and commissioning music written especially for the Society. Other events were classed as not a priority at the time; however, they may be resurrected next year. For example, aiming to beat the Plain Bob maximus record peal length of 6600 changes, and creating an inventory of all archive materials as well as tracking down old meeting reports and papers created electronically and not written up in the minute book. There are activities that are still ongoing, for example, the preparation of biographies, and it is anticipated that these will be followed through to completion in the coming year.

At the beginning of 2024 the Trinity Great Hall booking looked to be in jeopardy. Despite the original booking going through all the right channels, somehow Trinity catering managed to double-book the venue. We were confident that ours was the earlier booking, but we were not confident that this would make us immune to being ditched in favour of a booking by an eminent fellow of the college. Ultimately, whatever the miscommunication was internally it got resolved, and Trinity catering confirmed our booking. This was much the biggest spanner to be thrown into our planning activities and, along with the mounting costs associated with using this venue, a significant amount of time and effort went into exploring alternatives as we reconsidered whether Trinity was the right venue for us.

Separate, but linked, a request was made to Trinity College by the vicar of GSM on the SCY's behalf for a grant from the Advowson fund to cover hall hire charges. This request got stuck for many months in Trinity College's bureaucracy and we never formally heard back from them as to whether or not this grant request had been successful. However, the hall hire fees were ultimately waived, thus removing a significant cost item from our budget forecast.

A major uncertainty throughout the early planning and preparatory stages for the tercentenary celebrations was forecasting budget requirements. A number of high-cost items could not be pinned down, yet they had the potential to result in a significant deficit. This influenced decisions, for example, Cambridge Folk Festival attendance, choice of dinner venue, fixing of ticket prices, and when formal dinner invites were issued. To alleviate this situation and allow preparations to continue apace, a small number of individual members agreed, up to a limit, to underwrite these costs. Furthermore, at an EGM in November 2023 and again at the AGM in March 2024 separate proposals for funding by the SCY to underwrite activities linked to the tercentenary celebrations were made and approved. The acknowledgement by the Society that these celebrations are a good way of furthering the aims of the Society, and the generosity of individual members made a huge difference to how plans were expedited. The financial uncertainties created were managed extremely effectively by Phil Orme, and budget details are included in a separate financial report; hence they are not covered in this report.

## 3 Ringing performances

Throughout 2024 a total of 94 performances lodged on Bellboard have been associated with the Society's 300th anniversary year (see Appendix A for details.)

For 2025 a total of 25 performances lodged on Bellboard have been associated with the Society's 300th anniversary year (see Appendix B for details.)

Subsections 3.1 to 3.5 present ringing performances for 2024, including peal ringing and personal achievements along with a few local versus non-local statistics on these performances. Subsection 3.6 presents ringing performances during 2025.

*Note: Use of the term 'local' in this context means someone who rings regularly at SCY practices or services or is part of the wider 12-bell competition band.*

### 3.1 Peals

A total of 61 peals have been rung, 31 tower and 30 handbell:

- Peals ranged from maximus to doubles, the breakdown being: 9 maximus, 3 cinqués, 1 max and cinqués, 2 royal, 3 caters, 9 major, 3 triples, 30 minor, and 1 doubles
- Most tower bell peals were on 12 bells (13), either maximus, cinqués or both
- Most handbell peals were of minor (25)
- 36 peals were by a Society band
- 19 peals were on GSM bells
- Five long-length peals were rung (two tower, three handbell)
- First 5-bell peal in GSM tower, and on the back five (22 Feb)
- First SCY ladies' peal (9 Mar)
- Longest length peal in GSM tower (1 Apr)
- Five peals were rung across the dinner weekend (20-21 Sep)
- 500th peal for the Society (19 Oct)

### 3.2 Quarter peals

A total of 29 quarter peals (QP) have been rung, 26 tower and 3 handbell:

- QPs ranged from maximus to minimus, the breakdown being: 6 maximus, 2 cinqués, 1 royal, 3 caters, 8 major, 1 major and minor spliced, 3 triples, 4 minor, 0 doubles, and 1 minimus
- 19 QPs were on GSM bells
- A QP of Plain Bob minimus is believed to be the lightest quarter yet rung, at tenor weight 0.025oz
- Four QPs and one 720 extent were rung across the dinner weekend (20-21 Sep)

### 3.3 Peal ringing achievements

The following achievements are of note:

- Leading tower bell peal ringers: Jonathan Agg (19), Jadd Virji (17), Henry Pipe (15)
- Leading non-SCY local ringer: Catherine Morley (7)<sup>1</sup>

- Leading SCY non-local ringers: Jimmy Yeoman (7) and Brian Meads (6)
- 27 local SCY members have rung at least one peal in 2024
- Leading handbell peal ringers: Henry Pipe (29), David Pipe (25), Alfie Pipe (16), and Jonathan Agg (14)
- These four ringers have between them accounted for over 80% of all handbell peal band members
- In addition, two local SCY members have each rung one handbell peal, and three non-local SCY members have each rung one handbell peal
- Leading conductor: Henry Pipe (25, of which 21 handbell)
- Other ringers who have conducted more than one peal are David Pipe (10), Jonathan Agg (9), and Patrick Brooke (5)

### 3.4 Personal footnotes to peals

Many local ringers recorded personal achievements during the year, including:

- Phillip Orme - 300th peal on 12 bells (21 Sep)
- Kirsten Hawkins, June Mackay - First peal of Stedman Cinques (5 Oct)
- Catherine Morley - 500th peal (17 Oct)
- Jonathan Agg, Henry Pipe - Circled GSM tower to peals (14 Nov)
- Phillip Orme - 600th peal and 100th peal on the new GSM bells (24 Nov)
- Luke Smith and Jonathan Agg - 200th peal together (24 Nov)
- Jonathan Nash - First maximus (14 Dec)

### 3.5 Local versus non-local ringers and ringing

Most performances by far have been rung locally by local ringers. Even performances rung further afield have been by a predominantly local band of ringers.

- 40 performances rung on GSM bells
- Majority of performances (85) rung in Cambridgeshire
- Furthest afield performance rung in Strathcarron, Scotland (570 miles from GSM)
- One peal rung abroad, in County Mayo, Ireland (500 miles from GSM)
- Three performances were outside Cambridgeshire and rung by a predominantly non-local band
  - Peal of Bristol Maximus at Bury St Edmunds Cathedral church (14 Sep) – 6 local ringers
  - Long length handbell peal of Bristol Surprise Major in Godmanchester (17 Sep) - 0 local ringers
  - Peal of Double Norwich Court Bob Caters at Sheffield Cathedral (17 Nov) – 1 local ringer
- 39 non-local ringers joined us for the dinner weekend (20-21 Sep) to ring peals (5), QPs (4) and a 720 extent

### 3.6 Ringing performances in 2025

A total of 16 peals (8 tower, 8 handbell) have been rung.

- No long length peals (>10,000 changes) were rung though there was one of 7200 changes

Tower bell peal performances of note:

- Oxford Treble Bob rung to acknowledge a peal of the same method recorded on one of the historic peal boards and to remind ourselves of an erstwhile resolution by the Society:  
*'In July 1789 the Society passed a resolution to "meet in Great St Mary's tower, to ring Treble Bob on twelve bells, every Monday evening at 7 o'clock". 236 years later, a peal has been rung.'*
- 7200 Spliced Treble Dodging Minor (52m) (4 Sep)
- First peal of RABS for the Society (11 Oct)
- Peal rung by the current and past Masters of the Society (13 Dec)

Handbell peal performances of note:

- All handbell peals, 6 minor and 2 major, were spliced, with one being 324 methods (10 Oct)
- David Pipe and Henry Pipe rang in all handbell peals
- Henry Pipe called all bar one of the handbell peals

A total of 9 quarter peals (QP) have been rung, all on tower bells.

- All QPs bar one were rung on GSM bells

QP performances of note:

- The first QP on 13 bells by all the band (2 Mar)
- One QP of 2160 changes and 180 Treble Dodging Minor methods (1 Oct)
- A QP rung by past and present officers of the Society to mark the 300th anniversary of the first peal in the tower and the first peal by the Society (5 Nov)

## 4 Cambridge Folk Festival

*Thursday 25th to Sunday 28th July*

'Change-ringing' can be considered a form of English folk music, therefore, what better than to choose this novel way of marking the Society's tercentenary by seeking a bell ringing presence at this major event. The Cambridge Folk Festival is one of the longest running folk festivals in the world. Held each year since 1965 it attracts around fourteen thousand people. This venture was the brainchild of Gareth Davies who with George Unsworth started by approaching Cambridge City Council with a proposal for an 'outreach' opportunity linked to bell ringing. Everyone was both delighted and surprised when the Council agreed to let us make an appearance. Furthermore, they made a significant contribution towards our costs. Gareth and George's next challenge was to convert an idea into a reality, and everyone involved agreed that a positive result was achieved.

The primary physical ringing presence at the folk festival was the Charnborough mobile belfry that was hired for the duration. In addition, a set of handbells was provided by Gareth Davies, and 11 volunteers were recruited to help across the four days. These volunteers held regular short ringing demonstrations in the main area, and there were ringing performances on the mobile belfry, handbell performances of both change ringing and tune ringing, have-a-go sessions on the mobile belfry, and handbell group workshops.

We did not set ourselves any firm objectives linked to recruitment or outreach, as this was a novel thing to do. However, our presence was popular, and we were busy most of the time as a steady flow of festival goers were curious to find out more. Approximately 650 people had a go, many lapsed ringers stopped by, and we generated roughly 40 follow-up contacts. Our volunteers found the experience enjoyable, and our conclusion was that this is a great way of advertising what we do to the general public, and we should consider repeating this venture again in future.

## 5 Dinner weekend

Friday 20th to Sunday 22nd September

The primary objective of the 300th anniversary celebrations was to create a lasting memory of the long and distinguished heritage of the Society that will be accessible to generations to come.

This section reports on the schedule of activities organised for our guests, the organising team and their responsibilities, key roles performed by Society members and GSM ringers across the weekend, and links with GSM church. In combination, this created a memorable and enjoyable weekend for our many guests. A few facts and figures are provided and are testament to the success of the dinner weekend.

A write-up about the dinner weekend can be found in the Ringing World article published in Edition No. 5922, dated 25 October 2024, pg. 991-992 and pg. 1008. Where possible, information in that article is not repeated here.

Financial details for the weekend are covered separately in the Treasurer’s report on the dinner weekend.

### 5.1 Dinner weekend schedule

An overview of the dinner weekend schedule is captured in the snapshot below. The majority of activities went ahead as planned; however, a small number of events were cancelled as numbers were too small to make them viable.

## 5.4 Links with GSM church

Throughout the many months of organising and on the dinner weekend itself, the ringers at GSM received a significant amount of support and goodwill from the church, its ministry team, operations team and staff, the PCC, and the congregation.

This support and goodwill is best illustrated with a few examples across the dinner weekend:

- We were allowed the use of Michaelhouse for our reception without any charge
- We were permitted to do a lot of ringing on GSM bells across the weekend
- Ringers were given preferential access to the tower for large swathes of time
- The vicar was instrumental in getting our dining hall fees waived
- We were invited to be intimately involved in a ringing themed Sunday service, contributing to the
  - choice of music
  - handbell ringing
  - sermon
  - readings
  - prayers
- The church facilitated putting the exhibition up in Michaelhouse
- A good number of PCC members joined us for the reception and dinner

This event has served to further strengthen the bonds that ringers have with GSM church.

## 5.5 Facts and figures

In all, we had around 170 ringers and friends joining in the weekend's celebrations. For the dinner we had 163 guests. This far surpasses any previous dinners where numbers are nearer 50 guests or fewer.

Across the dinner weekend we scored a total of five peals (Meldreth, Rampton, GSM, Bourn, and Fulbourn) and four quarter peals (Histon twice, St Bene't's and St Andrew the Great) plus a touch of 720 surprise minor at Chesterton. This is considerably more ringing performances than we usually attempt on a dinner weekend.

We received 25 separate written thank you messages from guests and probably that number again of verbal messages of thanks. Overwhelmingly, the responses of guests were to convey how much they had enjoyed themselves, how well organised everything was, and to acknowledge how much work must have gone into making the weekend so memorable.

### 5.5.1 Breakdown for reception and dinner

#### Reception

- 165 attendees
- 55 bottles of Sparkling Wine - Tasmanian
- 8 cartons Fruit Juice
- 3 garden buckets with 7 bags of ice cubes, ~250mg Salt and water to cool the drinks
- 180 hire glasses - 0 breakages

#### Dinner choices, running order and gifts

163 sat to a 4-course meal with wines (147 had wine, 16 non-wine, 14 vegetarians, 6 special diets).

All guests had a Commemorative Coaster made of birch wood c/o The Ringing Master

### 6.1 Ringing for the election of the new Mayor

*Thursday, 23rd May 2024*

The Society has a long history of ringing at the mayor's election and for events that the mayor requested. For this year at least, the Society decided to recreate the tradition of special ringing for the election of the new Mayor which lapsed as an annual event in 1927.

Ringing took place from 10.30am to 11am on Thursday, 23<sup>rd</sup> May, immediately prior to the City Council's AGM, which started at 11am.

### 6.2 Photoshoot

*Saturday, 20 July 2024*

As part of the SCY's 300th anniversary celebrations we arranged for Neil Thomas, a ringer from St Peter Mancroft who does a lot of photography and whose photos often make the front cover of the Ringing World, to come to GSM and take some photos of ringing on the bells.

We already have a large number of good photos of the new bells and their installation; however, we do not have many photos of us ringing GSM bells where we own the copyright. The aim of this photoshoot was to get good photos of typical ringing positions in the GSM ringing room setting, with a mixture of close ups, wide views, and action shots, plus shots of arriving at the ringing room door, sitting around the table while ringing is taking place, and checking Hawkear outputs. Alongside this we also wanted to produce high quality photos of the peal boards in the ringing room.

The photoshoot started early at 8am when around 14 volunteers gave up part of their morning to participate. We were finished by 10am and some lovely photos were taken, which can be viewed here:

## 6.3 Church Times Festival of Preaching

*15-17 September 2024*

For the first time GSM church hosted this event, which spans three days and boasts around 400 delegates attending a variety of seminars, lectures, and worship.

Knowing that the Society has its tercentenary year, we were asked by GSM church operations whether we would be able to contribute in some way to this event. We provided the following:

- Photo exhibition in Michaelhouse (see subsection 6.4 below) about the history of the Society, its ringers and ringing down the centuries
- Demonstration and talk by Gareth Davies in GSM ringing room on the history of change ringing and how the relationship between churches and their bells has changed over the centuries
- Sunday evensong ringing to mark the start of the formal programme with Evensong at 5pm

We have not received any formal feedback though informally we have received positive comments.

## 6.4 Photo exhibition in Michaelhouse

*14 September to end October 2024*

A photo exhibition covering the 300-year history of the Society was produced for the Society's 300th dinner weekend and also for the Church Times Festival of Preaching (see subsection 6.3 above.)

In all, four very large (A0) and nine large (A1) boards were hung on the walls of Michaelhouse. Each board had a theme linked to ringers and ringing in Cambridge across the centuries.

For the pre-dinner drinks reception only, a freestanding board (half A0) listing all members of the Society, past and present, was on display.

## 6.5 New history of the Society

*Saturday, 21 September 2024*

Below is a short summary on the creation on a landmark book that provides new insights on the history of the Society.

In 2015 Gareth Davies began a PhD at Anglia Ruskin University, looking at the balance between ringing for pleasure and ringing for profit in Cambridge. The intention was that this research might also form the basis for a book to mark the 300th anniversary of the SCY. In the event, the completed doctoral thesis dealt only with its first 190 years from 1724 to 1913. After being awarded his doctorate Gareth extended his research to cover the remaining 110 years of the Society's history, and to explore its antecedents back to the early 16th century.

Dedicated to all members of the Society, past, present, and future, Foolish Youths and Substantial Rewards: A Social History of Bellringing in Cambridge was published by The Ringing World in late 2024. It was launched at the pre-dinner drinks reception in Michaelhouse on 21st September. The launch included a book signing session and Gareth also gave a short speech.

Most of the costs of publication and marketing, and all the financial risks of recouping their outlay, were met by The Ringing World. The Society contributed £300 to help pay for image rights, and 28 advance subscribers made a total donation of £700, over and above the cost to them of purchasing the book. Gareth did not take any royalties from sales of the book. Most production processes, except for the printing, were carried out by Ringing World staff: mainly Will Bosworth, the editor and member of the Society, with assistance from Trisha Shannon, the assistant editor. The book runs to 446 pages, and 500 copies were printed.

The Society owes an enormous debt of gratitude to both Gareth and Will for producing such a fitting history to mark the tercentenary of its foundation.

## 6.6 Bells on Sunday

*Sunday, 22 September 2024*

On the Sunday of the dinner weekend, the BBC Radio 4 ‘Bells on Sunday’ episode came from the church of St Mary the Great in Cambridge.

The write-up that went alongside this [recording of GSM bells](#) is below:

*Situated between the marketplace and the university there has been a church on the site since at least 1205 and bells since the late 15th century when much of the present building was constructed. For the last 300 years the bells are rung for services by the Society of Cambridge Youths, one of the oldest bell ringing societies, and who are this year celebrating the tri-centennial of their foundation in 1724. Today the tower holds a peal of twelve bells, cast by the Taylor Eayre and Smith foundry of Loughborough in 2009, with a twenty-four and a quarter hundredweight tenor in the note of D. We hear them ringing “Particles” Maximus.*

## 6.7 Handbell ringing at the British Museum

*Monday, 18 November 2024*

Following being contacted by the Events and Engagement team of the British Museum Friends, Phil Orme picked up the challenge of organising an SCY handbell ringing contribution to the recording of an annual festive film by the British Museum (BM) events team to be shared with their members, supporters, and patrons in the lead up to Christmas. The BM’s motivation was a celebration of the reopening to the public of the famous Reading Room, our motive was to take full advantage of an opportunity to showcase the art of bell ringing to a wide audience. Coincidentally, this also dovetailed nicely with the 300th anniversary celebrations.

The BM events team wanted to make recordings of both change ringing and tune ringing on handbells in the atmospheric setting of the BM Reading Room. A highly successful recording session that included a touch of plain-little-plain maximus and the ringing of three well known carols took place on the 18th of November. Prior to the recording session there was a trip to the BM to do sound checks and two separate practice sessions held in Cambridge. There was a lot of work behind the scenes driven forward by Phil Orme and Gareth Davies, there was plenty of coordinating with the BM events team, and there was a willingness of participants to free up diaries at short notice to make this happen.

A write-up by Phil Orme of the occasion, from its initial inception to the day of the recording, can be found in the Christmas / New Year edition of the Ringing World (“A night at the Museum”, Ed. 5930-32, 20 / 27 December 2024 and 3 January 2025, pg. 1224 to 1227) and the contents of that article are not repeated here.

## 6.8 Ancient Doubles revisited

*Friday, 29 November 2024*

In 2023, Richard Smith wrote a number of Ringing World articles on various old doubles methods. From his research, he noted that the early five-bell 'peals' (as they were called) differ quite radically from those we ring today. They often don't fit neatly into the modern paradigm of a method with a plain course and one or two simple calls, and some are perhaps best viewed as rules based. One or two involve jump changes. One or two look almost totally random.

A ringing session was held on Friday, 29th November at St Edward's church, Cambridge, to try a number of these older, more obscure peals. The purpose was to get a better appreciation of what these extents are actually like to ring, and to see whether any are worth reviving. The book, "Ancient Doubles Peals for Foolish Youths" written by Richard in 2024, takes a look at some of the extents of doubles that were popular in yesteryear but are now rarely rung. This book contains blue lines for a wide range of ancient doubles methods.

Many of these peals were composed in Cambridge by a man named Samuel Scattergood, probably in the 1660s or '70s. He was a student at Trinity and later curate of Cottenham. St Edward's still has the same six bells that Scattergood would have heard and very likely rang. They are the only six in the county where that is the case, so that makes them a fitting place to hold this session. What they lack in tuning they make up for in ease of ringing.

The ringing session was enjoyable and engendered sufficient interest to warrant another session being organised in 2025.

## 6.9 Additional walks and talks by Gareth Davies

*Sunday, 17 November 2024 and Sunday, 15th December*

Following the popularity of Gareth's walks and talks during the dinner weekend, two additional sessions have been scheduled. This is to accommodate those local ringers who were unable to come along to them during the dinner weekend.


